## Communication Access Tips for Displaying Symbols

**Communication Access** is how we support and facilitate interaction with people who have speech, language and hearing difficulties. It improves safety and care.



The Communication Access symbol<sup>1</sup> indicates a commitment to facilitating Communication Access. It signifies two (or more) people interacting; giving and receiving information; listening and watching.



The open ear may indicate that a person has a hearing loss or that the environment supports people who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Posting these symbols is a privilege; they show that AHS cares

## How to support an individual who has a communication need

- Learn to identify patients with communication needs and the practical strategies you can use to improve Communication Access.
- Post the symbols on a patient's chart or whiteboard to indicate that the person
  has a difficulty with speech, language or hearing. Talk with them and the team
  about how to best support communication and confirm understanding.

## How to indicate a communication-friendly environment

 Post the symbols in public areas where staff know the meaning of the symbols, have been exposed to strategies, and are committed to supporting Communication Access.
